

Section 1 American Football Ireland Child Safeguarding Statement

The Irish American Football Association (IAFA) provides American Football activities to young people through participation in clubs nationwide and through the national u20s programme. The IAFA is committed to the enjoyment of American Football by young people. It values and encourages the participation of parents, coaches and volunteers in American Football for participants of 15 years of age to 18 years of age. The policy of the IAFA regarding safeguarding children is to respect the dignity and rights of all Youth Players. The IAFA will strive throughout its organisation to promote, create and maintain safe environments for all Youth Players. It will endeavour to maintain the core values of the association – Integrity, Respect, Inclusivity, Excellence and Teamwork.

Following a risk assessment for any potential harm to a child while involved in American Football, we have identified areas of risk and the list of procedures to be put in place to manage these risks. These risks were categorised under the following headings: Recruitment, Club and Coaching Practices, Reporting, Complaints, Facilities and Communication. Section 3 indicates the areas of potential risk of harm, the likelihood of the risk occurring, and gives the required policy, guidance or documents required to alleviate these risks. Our child safeguarding statement has been developed in line with requirements under the Children First Act 2015 and in Northern Ireland, the Club Framework for Safeguarding Standards.

The IAFA expects all of those involved in Youth American Football to adopt and supervise the implementation of these safeguarding principles and standards. The IAFA recognises that implementation is an ongoing process and it is committed to the implementation of this Child Safeguarding Statement and accompanying safeguarding policy to keep youths involved in

American Football safe from harm. This Child Safeguarding Statement will be reviewed in April 2021, or as soon as is reasonably practicable after there has been a material change in any matter to which the statement refers. Section 2 Principles to Safeguard Children from Harm

IAFA is committed to safeguarding children and, by working under the guidance of our Safeguarding Policies our staff, both volunteers and employed, working with our young people, throughout the organisation, seek to create a safe environment for young people to grow and develop within sport. The following set of principles should be adhered to:

- Importance of childhood
 - The importance of childhood should be understood and valued by everyone involved in youth football.
- Needs of the child
 - o All youth football experiences should be guided by what is best for children. This means that adults should have a basic understanding of the emotional, physical and personal needs of young people.
- Integrity in relationships
 - Adults interacting with young people in American Football are in a position of trust and influence. They should always ensure that young people are treated with
 integrity and respect, and the self-esteem of young people is enhanced.
- Fair Play
 - Youth Football should be conducted in an atmosphere of fair play. The principles of fair play should always be emphasised, and organisers should give clear guidelines regarding acceptable standards of behaviour.
- Quality atmosphere & ethos
 - Youth Football should be conducted in a safe, positive and encouraging atmosphere.
- Competition
 - Competition is an essential element of sport and should be encouraged in an age appropriate manner. A child centred ethos will help to ensure that competition and specialisation are kept in their appropriate place.

Section 3 AFI Risk Assessment

This risk assessment considers the potential for harm to come to children whilst they are in the care of the Irish American Football Association. This risk assessment has been carried out prior to the publication of the IAFA's Child Safeguarding Statement (Section 11 (1b) Children First Act 2015). In this context and in accordance with the requirements of Section 11 (1) of the Children First Act 2015, that states "as a provider of a relevant service we will undertake an assessment of any potential harm to a child while availing of the service"; the risk is of abuse and not general health and safety risk. This risk assessment is also in accordance with Sport Northern Ireland's Club Framework for Safeguarding Standards in Sport.

The risk assessment indicates the areas of potential risk of harm, the likelihood of the risk occurring, and gives the required policy, guidance or process documents required to alleviate these risks. The list of risks identified and procedures to manage these risks are listed in the following categories.
